Before submitting your paper, please make sure it complies with the following guidelines.

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- We only accept papers written by academics or students.
 - We encourage the submission of work that has not been published before, and that is not under consideration for publication elsewhere.
 - We discourage posts that merely summarise cases, preferring papers including a critical analysis or exploring topical issues.
 - All submissions are to be written in English. Please follow English quotation rules (for instance, Oxford University Standard for Citation of Legal Authorities – [OSCOLA](#)).
 - Please use our [template](#) and send your paper as a .doc file.
 - Authors may be required to revise their contribution before final acceptance.
 - If the paper is accepted, authors will be asked to choose a picture to illustrate their post.
 - Papers should all include an abstract (100-250 words).

Competition Forum has three sections open to submissions: Blog, Resources and Forum. In your email, please indicate in which section you wish to publish your paper.

- The Blog section is dedicated to comments on topical issues and critical pieces (2 000 – 8 000 words).
- The Resources section welcomes in-dept studies, PhD thesis resumes, Master thesis. There is no word limit in this section.
